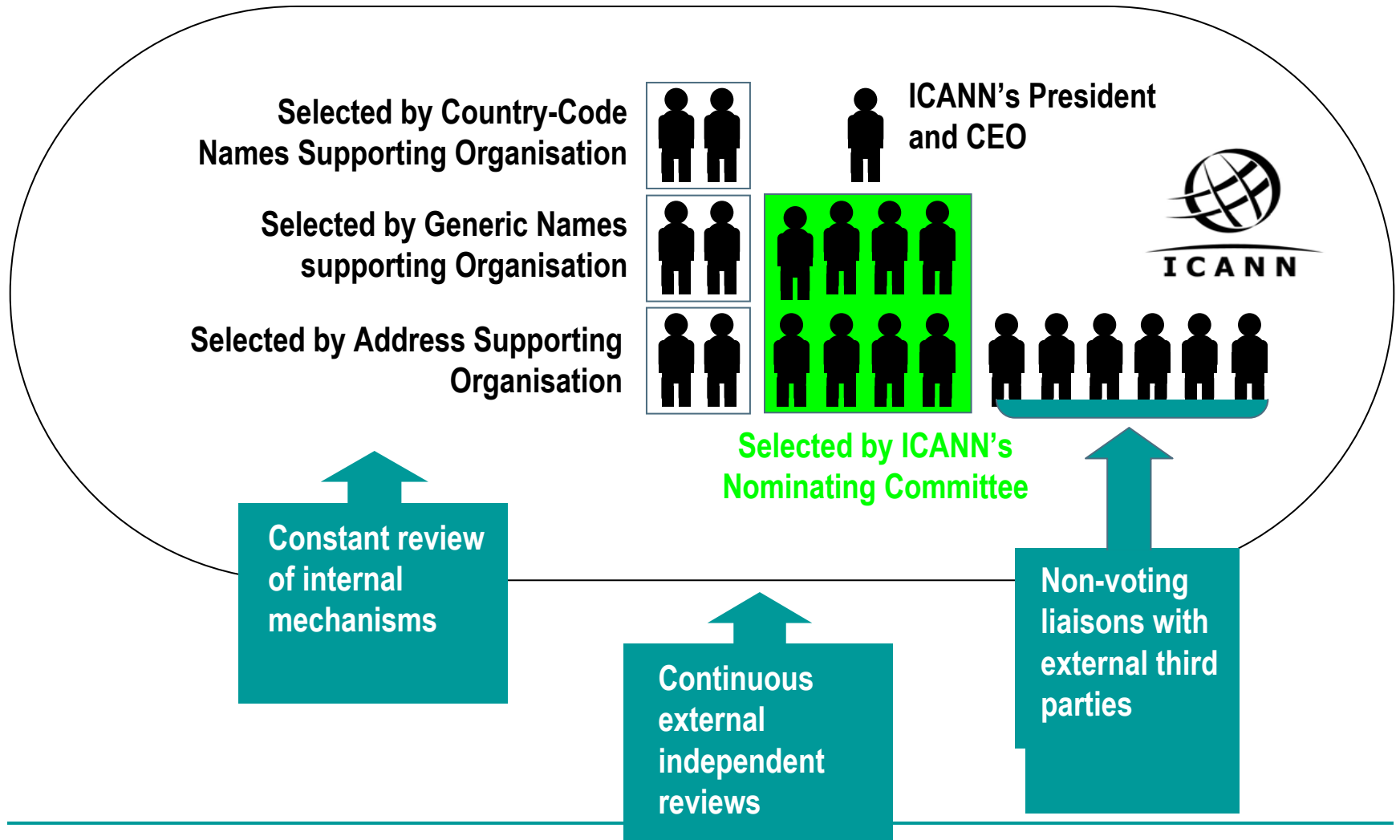

NomCom selected 3 seats for 2004 (3-year terms – through Annual Meeting 2007)



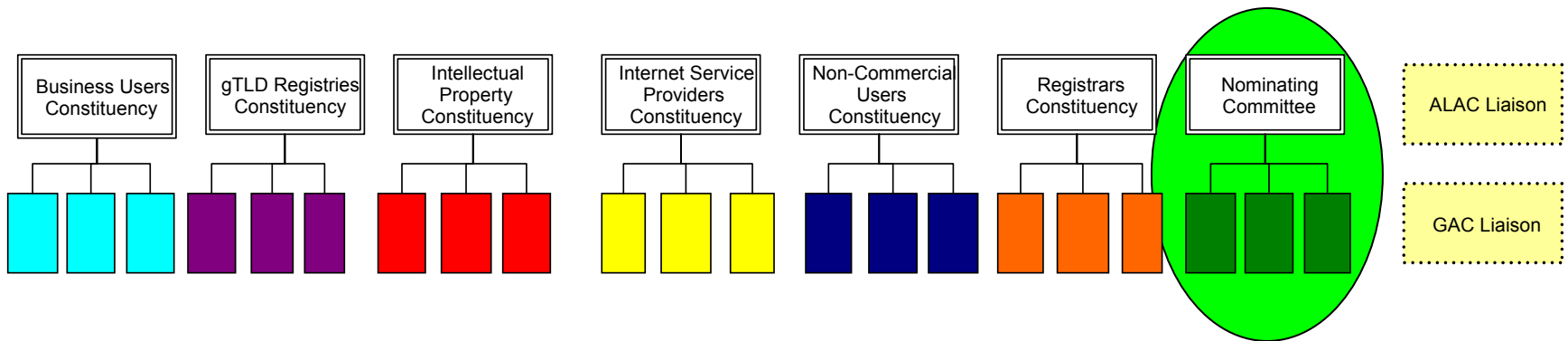
Slate 1: The ICANN Board

NomCom selected 1 seat for 2004 (2-year term – through Annual Meeting 2006)



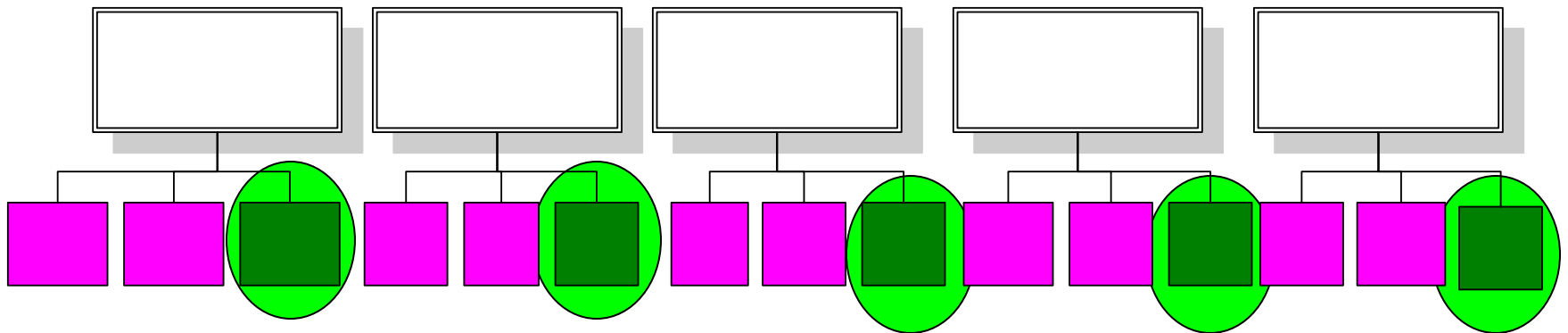
Bylaws provide for 2 representatives per constituency – Transition Article allowed for 3 representatives per constituency and this has been extended by the Board

The Bylaws provide that the 2 members from each region are chosen by the RALO (Regional At-Large Organization) as shown. Until these RALOs are in place, the members are selected by the Board with nominations by the At-Large Organizing Committee.

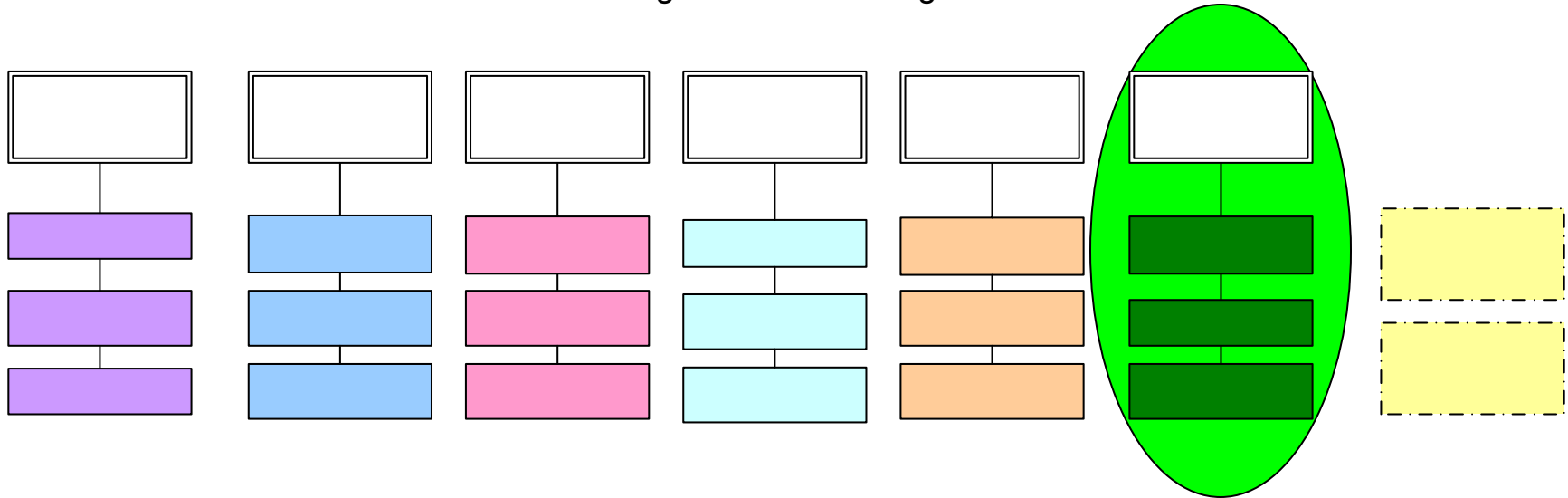

Origin & Design of Nominating Committee Process (NomCom)

- Emerged from 2002 Comprehensive ICANN reform and restructuring process
- A key element of ICANN 2.0 organizational structure
- A new way to fill a portion of key leadership positions
- Operates in parallel to other selection processes for leadership positions
- Functions independently

Charge of the Nominating Committee

- Pursue broad public interest of global Internet community, *not* particular interests of any constituency, employer, or organization
- Develop and publish Committee Procedures
- Make Final Selection of Nominees
 - Of highest integrity and capability
 - Committed to place broad public interest of global Internet community ahead of any particular interests
 - Knowledgeable about environment in which ICANN operates
- Use Bylaw-specified Criteria, Eligibility Requirements, Other Considerations

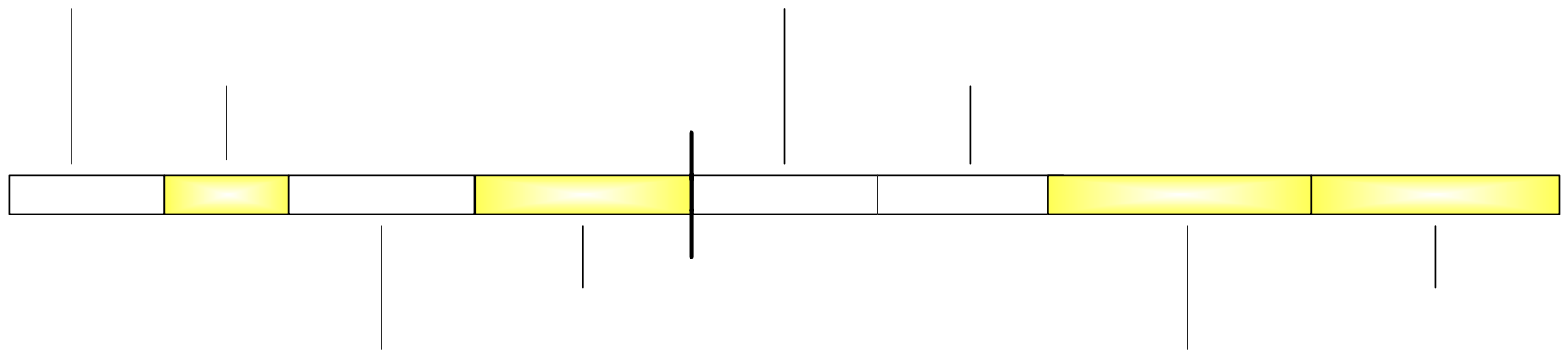
Composition of 2004 Nominating Committee

- Composition and criteria for membership defined in Bylaws
- Members act on behalf of global Internet community
- Members carry no personal commitments to particular individuals, organizations, or commercial objectives

NomCom 2004 Timeline

20 April 2004	Invitations sent to constituencies/groups to select NomCom members
25 May 2004	NomCom holds first teleconference meeting
30 June 2004	NomCom issues Formal Call for Recommendations & Statements of Interest
25 August 2004	Submission deadline for Statements of Interest
13-14 September 2004	NomCom holds face-to-face meeting to select Nominees
September/October 2004	Due diligence carried out on selected Nominees
11 October 2004	NomCom announces 2004 Nominees
4 November 2004	NomCom holds final teleconference meeting
December 2004	Nominees take office at conclusion of Annual Meeting

Selection Factors

- Six detailed criteria
- Eligibility requirements and specific exclusions
- Role specific considerations
- Diversity (cultural, functional, geographic)
- Term limits on some positions

Bylaws Criteria

- Stature and specific desired characteristics
- Understanding of ICANN's mission and potential impact
- Committed to ICANN's success
- Familiarity with one or more of specific functional areas needed
- Willingness to serve as an uncompensated volunteer
- Able to work and communicate in English

Key Issues Addressed

- Balancing NomCom and SO pathways
- Gender diversity as critical part of cultural diversity
- Confidentiality re candidate identity
- Balancing desirability of continuity and renewal
- Keeping all candidates under consideration to end of process
- Scope of due diligence a volunteer committee can undertake


Recommendations

- Begin NomCom process earlier in the year
- Focus on recruitment and evaluation
- Develop procedures for filling any vacancies in NomCom-selected seats
- Enhance orientation for Nominees

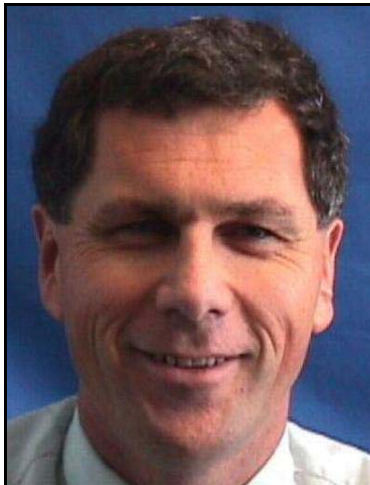

The Focus of the NomCom

- 1) Focused on building slates of accomplished, 'best qualified' Candidates who place the public interest of the global Internet community ahead of any particular interest
- 2) Balance the other ICANN leadership selection processes based on Supporting Organizations and Constituencies

Together:

Ensure that ICANN benefits from functional, cultural, geographic diversity in its policy development and decision making as the Internet evolves.

Other Considerations in Selection

- Key Challenges before ICANN
- Experience relevant for roles of the Board, GNSO Council, ALAC, ccNSO Council
- Statement of Interest (SOI) provided by the Candidate
- Comments from References and NomCom members
- Selection of highly qualified Candidates, both 'Multi-talented' and 'Deeply Talented'
- Mix of experience and skills in each slate to enable each ICANN body to fulfill its role effectively
- Competing values of continuity and change

Basic Operating Principles

- Consensus decision making
- Balancing commitment to openness and transparency with respect for privacy and confidentiality of candidates
- Commitment to Code of Ethics re: integrity, conflict of interest, and confidentiality
- Fairness and consistency for candidates
- Disclosure of NomCom members' affiliations
- Collaborative cross-constituency work processes
- Flexibility to capitalize on emerging information
- Encouragement of holistic perspective by focus on construction of slates, not just individual candidates

NomCom Code of Ethics

- Central to Procedures:
 - *All* NomCom Members and Staff agreed to abide by Code of Ethics
- Managing Conflicts of Interest
 - Disclosure and recusal for actual conflicts
 - Avoiding the appearance of conflict
 - Subcommittee: Alan Davidson, Pavan Duggal, Ellen Shankman

NomCom Openness and Transparency

- Published Committee Composition, Bios
- Published Committee Procedures, Formal Call, FAQs
- Broad outreach and recruiting
- Recruiting by NomCom members and others
- Mechanisms for public input

Design of the NomCom Selection Process

- Solicitation and recruitment of Candidates
 - *Only* Statements of Interest considered
 - Recommendations used only to widen the Candidate Pool
- Review and evaluation of Candidates
 - Focused on aggregate qualities and strengths of Slates (not individuals)
 - *All* Candidates in consideration until final Slates were chosen
